





## **FORHP Health Workforce Contributions**



#### Research

FORHP funds various research products focused on health workforce in rural areas. Examples of recently published products include Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) waiver providers and racial/ethnic diversity of the rural family physician workforce.

## **Policy Analysis**

FORHP assesses the impact of current policies and proposed regulatory changes on the rural health workforce, such as Medicare Graduate Medical Education (GME) and provider payment models.

### **Programs**

FORHP funds programs to support several workforce grant initiatives that bolster the physician, public health, health administration and health information technology (IT) workforce in rural communities.

## **FORHP Programs**

#### **Workforce Portfolio**

#### Rural Public Health Workforce Training Network Program



Expands workforce capacity by supporting public health job training, development, and placement in rural and tribal communities. In FY22, awarded \$47M to 32 community-based organizations.

## Rural Residency Planning and Development Program



Provides start-up funding to establish new rural residency programs to train resident physicians in rural clinical settings. In FY22, awarded \$9.7M to 13 organizations.

## **Delta Region Rural Health Workforce Training Program**



Enhances health care delivery by creating training programs for administrative support professionals in rural health care facilities. In FY22, awarded \$2.3M to 5 organizations.

## Rural Telementoring Training Center Program



Provides training and supports academic medical centers and other centers of excellence to provide technology-enabled telementoring that will equip the health care workforce in rural communities to meet critical demands while improving access to health care.

#### Rural Health Research Center Program



Through FORHP-funded research centers, 150 research publications on health workforce have informed the public and decision-makers on issues related to workforce distribution, shortages and access to quality care. Currently, there is one research center that primarily focuses on workforce topics.

## Other FORHP Workforce Activities



FORHP funds several projects through other program offerings (e.g., Rural Communities Opioid Response Program (RCORP), 3RNet, State Offices of Rural Health (SORH), Outreach grants, Technical Assistance Centers) that either directly or indirectly support the rural health workforce.












## Delta Region Rural Health Workforce Training Program


## Rural Residency Planning & Development (RRPD) Program

### **Creating Sustainable Rural Residencies**

#### RRPD Technical Assistance (RRPD-TA), a cooperative agreement

- Awarded \$2M in FY18 to establish the RRPD-TA Center and again \$4.3M in FY21 to provide direct technical assistance and resources to RRPD awardees and applicants.
- Consortium led by the University of North Carolina (UNC) at Chapel Hill consists of experts in all aspects of rural residency development and structured into 3 regional hubs (central, eastern, and western).
- Free resources and tools (e.g., webinars, presentations) are available on the RuralGME.org portal for key topics such as program accreditation, financing, faculty development, and resident recruitment and training.




## **RRPD Program**

#### **Creating Sustainable Rural Residencies**

#### **FY19-FY23 RRPD Grant Program**

- Since 2019, HRSA awarded \$54M to 73
   award recipients spanning across 36 state, 1
   U.S. Territory and 6 medicine disciplines.
- Awards up to \$750,000 total to organizations to establish new, accredited and sustainable rural residency programs in family medicine, internal medicine, psychiatry, general surgery, preventive medicine, and obstetrics and gynecology, over a 3-year grant period.
- Supports planning and development costs, such as accreditation, faculty development and recruitment, curriculum development and resident recruitment.

## **RRPD Program Goals & Outcomes To-Date**

**Objective 1:** By the end of the period of performance, RRPD award recipients are required to establish new rural residency programs or RTPs that is ACGME accredited and has a strong sustainability plan for a stable future financial outlook.



**41** programs applied for ACGME Accreditation.



**38** received ACGME Accredited for a total of 503 approved residency positions.

<u>Objective 2:</u> RRPD award recipients are expected to matriculate residents by the academic year (AY) following the end of the grant period of performance (e.g., FY20 RRPD Cohort must start matriculating residents by AY 2024).



From AY20 through AY22, 22 programs matriculated **180+ residents** in family medicine, internal medicine and psychiatry.



For the 2023 MATCH, **30** programs participated in NRMP MATCH and anticipate matriculating **122** residents for Academic Year 2023.







#### Age-Adjusted Death Rates of Drug-Related Overdose 2018-2020





## Rural Communities Opioid Response Program (RCORP)

#### **Reducing OUD and SUD in Rural Communities**

- The <u>Rural Communities Opioid Response Program</u> is a multi-year initiative launched in FY 2018 that provides direct funding and technical assistance to rural communities to improve access to behavioral health care services, including SUD/OUD prevention, treatment, and recovery.
- Since 2018, FORHP has made RCORP investments across 47 states and 2 territories, reaching 1,800+ rural counties
- In 2023, HRSA awarded over \$80 million through more than 120 grants and cooperative agreements that will directly support the behavioral health needs of rural communities across the country.





# RCORP – Workforce Successes, Challenges, and Lessons Learned

- In our most recent year of grantee data:
  - More than 2 million rural individuals received direct prevention, treatment, and recovery services,
  - More than 112,000 individuals received medication assisted treatment.
  - Nearly 635,000 individuals trained through RCORP (stigma, naloxone, mental health first aid, opioid prescribing guidelines, other topics)





## RCORP – Workforce Successes, Challenges, and Lessons Learned

- In the 6 months from March August 2022, over **2800 providers** in RCORP consortiums prescribed MAT.
- At the same time, a general unwillingness to provide MAT was the most cited barrier when assessing provider barriers to MAT.
- Other barriers include:
  - MAT not being seen as a best practice
  - Perceived case complexity
  - Stereotypes about individuals with SUD/OUD





# RCORP – Workforce Successes, Challenges, and Lessons Learned

- Almost 90% of grantees utilize peer recovery workers in their RCORP consortiums.
  - In the Implementation 1 cohort, having a peer support worker was found to be related to meeting a community's need for MAT
- Grantees have identified the following barriers to utilizing peers:
  - Lack of education among SUD treatment professionals to on how to optimally use the peer recovery workforce
  - Struggle to properly monitor/support peers
  - Stigma against peers related to their recovery status, criminal status, lack of education/training, etc.
  - Large case loads
  - Lack of funding for peer programs, low pay for workers, billing/reimbursement issues for peer services





#### What's New

HHS Boosts Funding for COVID-19 Response in Rural Areas. On Tuesday, the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services (HHS) announced \$398 Million for COVID-19 testing and mitigation. The funds will be distributed by State Offices of Rural Health to 1,540 rural hospitals through the Small Rural Hospital Improvement Program.

One Month Left to Enroll in, or Change, Health Insurance Marketplace Coverage. Last week, HHS released a report on current trends and challenges to accessing affordable health care in rural America. Analysts found that, although uninsured rates have fallen in rural areas, other barriers to care such as geographic distances, infrastructure limitations, and provider shortages contribute to rural health disparities. The report comes one month before the special enrollment period for qualified individuals and families ends on August 15. As noted in the HHS brief, 65 percent of the 1.9 million rural uninsured individuals in HealthCare.gov states may be able to find a zero-premium plan on the platform.

NOSORH Accepting 2021 Community Star Nominations. The National Organization of State Offices of Rural Health (NOSORH) seeks nominations until August 2 of individuals, organizations, or consortia making a big difference in the health of rural communities.


